<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Task One</b></p> <p>BE A DETECTIVE! TRY TO SOLVE SOME MYSTERIES! Go to the websites below and read the interactive short mystery stories. Try to work out who did it from the clues in the story. Good luck.</b></li> </ul> <p><u>Challenge!</u> For each mystery write down all the clues you can find. You might also indicate which clues are red herrings.</p> <p><b>Parent/carer signature and date:</b> .....</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Task Two</b></p> <p>Write your own Mystery story (it is a good idea to do task 1 before attempting this task, as it may help inspire you). Your story should contain at least 4 paragraphs and be no shorter than a page long.</p> <p>Pick one of these scenarios and write a mystery about it:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Your best friend goes missing</li> <li>• Something is stolen out of your fridge</li> <li>• Your favourite toy has disappeared</li> </ul> <p>Remember to leave clues to help the reader and the detective character guess what may have happened.</p> <p><u>Challenge!</u> Use a thesaurus to find better synonyms for some of the verbs, adverbs and adjectives you have used.</p> <p><b>Parent/carer signature and date:</b> .....</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Task Three</b></p> <p>This half term, in Science we will be looking at air resistance. Can you come up with an experiment or activity to test or explore air resistance? AVOID making rotocopters as we will be making them in school. Use at least a whole page to explain or show what you did and what you discovered from doing it.</p> <p>Use the link below to help get you started. <a href="https://www.bbc.co.uk/education/clips/zjntsbk">https://www.bbc.co.uk/education/clips/zjntsbk</a></p> <p><u>Challenge!</u> Create a fair test (this means you change only one of the variables and record the test scientifically), including these sections:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Title</li> <li>• Equipment</li> <li>• Explanation of the test</li> <li>• Hypothesis (what you think may happen)</li> <li>• Results</li> <li>• Conclusion</li> </ul> <p><b>Parent/carer signature and date:</b> .....</p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Task Four</b></p> <p>Create a comic strip showing a detective/sleuth interviewing a suspect about a trophy that has gone missing from outside the Head teacher’s office. Similar to task 2 it is a good idea to have completed task 1 prior to this task, as it will help inspire you.</p> <p>The detective/sleuth should question him/her about whether he/she did it, where he/she was and if he/she knows anything about it. The detective/sleuth and suspect can be whomever you like.</p> <p>Write the conversation as a part of a real story. E.g. “Where were you at 3:15am?” asked the Detective sternly. John looked at his feet and replied shakily, “I... Write a letter to Miss Lippa or Miss Golding trying to persuade them to either: make lunchtime 10 minutes longer or to buy a particular piece of new playground equipment. The letter should be at least half a page long. Try to include at least 3 to 5 key persuasive points.
