Main Teaching		
<p>Ask the question, what is an adjective?</p> <p>It is a word that describes a noun.</p> <p>e.g. It was a terrible book. She is a beautiful princess.</p> <p>You have 30 seconds, how many adjectives can you think of to describe a cave? (Did you think of any of Mrs Pattenden's adjectives – check the mark scheme)</p>		

Adjectives can come before or after a noun.

The book she read on holiday was **terrible**.
She read a **terrible** book on holiday.

Rewrite these sentences with the adjective after the noun:

Rita looked at the **beautiful** flower.
Danni ran away from the **terrifying** giant.
He wanted to play with the **green** ball.

If you want to describe a noun in detail, you can use more than one adjective.

For example: She had a **mouldy, smelly, overpriced** sandwich.

When you have a list of adjectives like this, separate them with commas.
