<b>Main Teaching</b>		
<p>Ask the questions:          What are punctuation marks?          Why are they important?          What punctuation marks do you know?</p>		
<p>Discuss the following:  <b>What are punctuation marks?</b>  <i>Punctuation marks are the symbols that you see at the end of sentences in writing.</i></p>		
<p><b>Why are they important?</b>  <i>Punctuation marks tell the reader when to take a breath and how the sentence should be read.</i></p>		
<p><b>What punctuation marks do you know?</b>  <i>You might have thought of full stops, question marks, comma or exclamation marks.</i></p>		

What is a question?

A question is something that you ask and would mostly expect an answer.



These are all examples of words that can start a question.

### **Caterpillar Shoes**


