<p>Beat the teacher. How many nouns can you write down that you can see in the picture in 1 minute? Will you beat Miss Ottley?</p>		
Main Teaching		
<p>What is a noun? A noun is a naming word. The name of a person, place or thing e.g. dog, pencil or cat.</p> <p>What is a suffix? A suffix is a letter or group of letters that goes on the end of a word and changes the word's meaning.</p> <p>What is singular? Singular means only one of something e.g. frog.</p> <p>What is plural? Plural means more than one e.g. three cats.</p> <p>Show examples of how the words change from singular to plural.</p>		


Singular = 1		Plural = more than 1
One dog	→	Lots of dogs
One door	→	Lots of doors
One pencil	→	Lots of pencils
One lamp	→	Lots of lamps

There are lots of rules when changing words from singular to plural. BE CAREFUL!
We are going to look at just two of the rules.

For most words we just add 's' to the end of it to change it into a plural.
For example one pear, three pears.

desk	→	desks	month	→	months
book	→	books	train	→	trains
pen	→	pens	dog	→	dogs

If the word ends with one of these sounds (see below) we add es.



To change these words in to plurals, add 'es'. For example one brush, two brushes.

box → boxes

dish → dishes

glass → glasses

church → churches




butterfly wing leg rock mud flower tree bush fence leaf stalk sky






