<p>Learning Intention WALT use apostrophes to show possession and contraction</p>	<p>Key Vocabulary: Contraction Apostrophes Possession Singular Proper nouns</p>	<p>What you will need: Pen Coloured pens/pencils</p>
Starter		
<p>Let's look at the word apostrophe. Watch the first part of the video about how to pronounce it and where the word came from.</p> <p>Words that include the phoneme <i>ph</i> usually come from the country of <b>Greece</b> from a long time ago.</p> <p>Words that have <i>phone</i> in them have something to do with 'sound'. e.g. <i>phonics</i> is about the sounds that letters make; a <i>saxophone</i> is a musical instrument.</p> <p>Ask an adult if they can help you write as many words that have <i>ph</i> in them. Here are a few more to get you started: <i>alpha, Philip, Sophie,</i></p>		
		
Main Teaching		
<p>For this lesson, we are going to continue using apostrophes for contractions (<i>joining two words to make one shorter word</i>) and to show that something belongs to something or somebody.</p> <p>The sentences in the challenges today are all needing to have at least one apostrophe. Please use a colour key to underline or highlight whether the apostrophe is used to show possession or contraction.</p> <p><i>possession</i>      <i>contraction</i></p> <p>e.g. I am going to read my book.</p> <p><i>I'm going to read my book.</i></p>

Harry has used an apostrophe where an **s** has been used to show more than one noun. **Plural** nouns (more than one) are usually shown by adding s, for example: one dog, two dogs; one egg, lots of eggs.

His next step could be to learn when to use an apostrophe – to show when something belongs to something or somebody and to show when two words are joined together and a letter has been removed. Letters are missing.
