Monday	<ol style="list-style-type: none">1) Why did Elizabeth's father wear a white suit? He owned a sugar refinery (factory) and it represented the sugar.2) On page 2 we are told how Elizabeth's father would describe her and on page 5 how her aunt would describe her. Can you find the two different adjectives to describe Elizabeth? On page 2 Elizabeth's father describes her as shy and on page 5 Elizabeth believes her aunt thinks she is stubborn.3) How were women's lives different to men's in 1821? Girls were not given a proper education and most people thought that they weren't as smart as boys. They were not allowed to have careers such as doctors, lawyers or bankers and were instead expected to stay at home and act like 'ladies'. If they were poor, they became servants in houses or worked in factories, taverns or farms.4) On page 13, find a word that means 'foolishness' Folly means foolishness.5) What is your opinion about the way Elizabeth's father dealt with the children's behaviour? Answer should include an opinion and supporting evidence For example: I think Elizabeth's father dealt with their behaviour in a kind but firm way because he answered their requests in a poem explaining his reasons.
Tuesday	<ol style="list-style-type: none">1) Why didn't the Blackwell children attend school? Girls did not go to school in those days and the family did not follow the Church of England religion so the boys did not go to school either.2) What event in chapter 3 signals the change of fortunes for the Blackwell family? The refinery burning down was the beginning of the family losing a lot of money.3) What was Mr Blackwell's solution to their money troubles? Mr Blackwell decides to move the family to America in the hope of solving their money problems4) On page 22 what two words does the author use show that America was exciting and still relatively unexplored in the time the book is set? New World is how people thought of America in the time the book is set.5) What is the word used for lower class passengers on board a ship? Steerage is the term given to lower class passengers on a ship.
Wednesday	<ol style="list-style-type: none">1) When did the Blackwell family arrive in America? They reached America in October 1832.2) Explain how the different household members felt about their new home. The children missed the space in their English home, the servants didn't like having to carry water from the pump and the aunts complained about the cold and how much fuel cost.3) How did Mr Blackwell feel about slavery? How do you know from the text? Mr Blackwell was against slavery. We know this because he became involved in antislavery activities and held meetings in his home. He also became friends with the editor of a newspaper called Liberator which was devoted to ending slavery.

	<p>4) In what way did his daughters support Mr Blackwell in his work for Black Rights? The girls set up a small school for black children.</p> <p>5) Where did the family move to when they, once again, ran into money troubles? The family moved to Cincinnati, Ohio.</p>
Thursday	<p>1) Why did Mr Blackwell want to use sugar beet instead of sugar can in his new factory? Mr Blackwell wanted to use sugar beets in his factory as that way he wouldn't need to rely on suppliers who used slave labour.</p> <p>2) After Mr Blackwell died, what did the family do to make money? After Mr Blackwell died the family set up a boarding school to make money.</p> <p>3) How did Elizabeth feel about teaching? Use evidence in the text to support your answer. Elizabeth didn't like teaching. We know this because in the text it says 'Elizabeth longed to escape.' and 'She wrote in her journal, Oh, for a lodge in some vast wilderness, far away from children!'</p> <p>4) What event helped Elizabeth decide what she wanted to do with her life? When she visited a family friend who was dying of cancer. The lady told her that she hadn't visited the doctor sooner as she did not want to be examined by a man. She suggested that Elizabeth become a doctor.</p> <p>5) How do we know that Elizabeth's brother supported her new career choice? Her brother, Harry said "If anyone can do it, our Elib can!"</p>

'Blazing a trail' means to find a new path or method for doing something. Elizabeth was the first woman in her profession and she led the way for other women to become doctors.
