Starter (10 minutes)

Main Teaching		
Recap using and in a sentence. I have a cat called Sooty. I have a hamster called George.		

Both of these sentences make sense on their own but they are very short and simple. We can join them together using a conjunction.

I have a cat called Sooty and I have a hamster called George.

Where would and go in these sentences?

I like going to the cinema. My sister likes going to the shops.

The girl had long blonde hair. She wore a purple dress.

It is cold outside. It's making me shiver.

I like going to the cinema **and my** sister likes going to the shops.

The girl had long blonde hair **and she** wore a purple dress.

It is cold outside **and it's** making me shiver.

What is a conjunction?

A conjunction is a word which joins two parts of a sentence.

and but

These are co-ordinating conjunctions. We use them to join two sentences together.

'but' is also a coordinating conjunction.

But: is used to connect statements that express opposite ideas.

I went to the shop. The shop was closed.

I went to the shop **but** the shop was closed.




